HEALTHY SINDH- WEALTHY SINDH: HEALTH SECTOR BUDGET ANALYSIS OF SINDH, 2021-22

1. INTRODUCTION

The following report offers a comprehensive analysis of the state of various development projects in Sindh's Health sector. In a healthcare ecosystem where quality and timely medical services are paramount, understanding these projects' financial and operational status is essential for long-term planning and resource allocation. The data set includes ongoing and new schemes slated for completion in the near future. The report aims to provide insights into the total number of projects, their statuses—ongoing, new, or withheld—their estimated costs, and the allocation and utilization of funds for the fiscal year 2021-2022.

This summary provides key financial indicators such as total estimated cost, total allocation for 2021-22, total final budget for 2021-22, total released during 2021-22, and total expenditure for 2021-22. Additionally, the report highlights the rate of utilization of the released funds to offer a snapshot of project efficiency. Extraordinary figures or outliers are also noted for special consideration.

This synthesis serves as a critical tool for stakeholders, providing a high-level overview that should guide decision-making processes related to healthcare infrastructure development. METHODOLOGY

The methodology adopted for this report primarily involves two key steps: Data Compilation and Desk Analysis.

DATA COMPILATION:

• The initial phase involved gathering all relevant data concerning the development budget for the Health sector for the fiscal year 2021-22. This data was sourced from official budget books provided by the Sindh Government or shard on the Finance Department website.

DESK ANALYSIS:

• Post-data collection, a detailed desk analysis was carried out. This involved categorizing projects as ongoing, new, or withheld; calculating total costs, allocations, and expenditures; and evaluating fund utilization.

The data were then analyzed quantitatively to achieve the objectives laid out for this report. Special attention was given to identifying extraordinary figures in the projects, in accordance with the aims of the study.

This methodology ensures a robust and thorough analysis, allowing for an informed understanding of the status, efficiency, and areas for improvement in Health Sector projects for the fiscal year 2021-22.

2. PRELIMINARY OBSERVATIONS:

Sindh's health budget, a significant component of the province's Annual Development Programme (ADP), is divided into six subsectors. These subsectors are:

- 1. Foreign-aided projects
- 2. Medical Education
- 3. Teaching Hospitals
- 4. Other Hospitals
- 5. PHC Admin/Training
- 6. Preventive Programs

In a bid to understand the allocation and utilization of funds for health in Sindh, it's essential to look at the figures in the context of the overall Annual Development Programme (ADP). Here's a breakdown of the health budget of Sindh for the fiscal year 2021-22, compared with the total ADP.

1. NUMBER OF SCHEMES:

• Total Schemes under ADP: 3,315

• Health-specific Schemes: 171

The health sector encompasses just over 5% of the total number of schemes presented in the ADP.

1. Estimated Cost of Schemes (in PKR millions):

Total for ADP: 1,105,476.02

Health Schemes: 87,325

This indicates that approximately 7.9% of the total estimated cost of all schemes is designated for health. This includes all ongoing and newly proposed schemes for 2021-22.

2. BUDGET ALLOCATION FOR 2021-22 (IN PKR MILLIONS):

Total ADP Allocation: 222,550

Health Allocation: 18,500

The initial budget allocation dedicated 8.3% of the total funds to health.

3. FINAL BUDGET FOR 2021-22 (IN PKR MILLIONS):

• Total ADP: 248,933

Health: 18,422

After revisions and adjustments, the final health budget (Revised Estimates) for 2021-22 saw a slight decrease from its initial allocation, representing approximately 7.4% of the final total ADP.

4. RELEASE OF FUNDS (IN PKR MILLIONS):

Total ADP: 171,338

• Health: 11,899

The funds released for health schemes stood at nearly 6.9% of the total ADP release, reflecting a less proportional release in comparison to its initial allocation. The initial allocation for the Health sector was 8.3% of the total ADP.

5. EXPENDITURE (IN PKR MILLIONS):

Total ADP: 152,824Health: 8,541

By the year's end, health expenditures amounted to only 5.6% of the total ADP expenditure. This indicates a wide gap between funds released and actual expenditure in the health sector.

PRELIMINARY OBSERVATIONS:

The data suggests that while the initial allocation for health in the ADP was about 8.3%, the final expenditure was much lower, at only 5.6%. Despite the health sector receiving a release of funds at 6.9% of the total, the actual spending was below this. This discrepancy between funds released and actual expenditure warrants a deeper analysis to identify potential bottlenecks, inefficiencies, or challenges in utilizing the funds within the stipulated time frame.

In the subsequent sections, we will investigate deeper into the specifics of these schemes, the reasons behind the underutilization of funds, and potential recommendations to enhance the efficacy of health spending in Sindh.

SUBSECTOR 1: FOREIGN-AIDED PROJECTS:

The Foreign Aided projects are not necessarily fully supported by foreign project assistance. However, in most cases, the foreign component is the dominant one. The foreign-aided projects subsector is home to five development schemes, two new and three ongoing. The collective volume of these schemes is PKR 1487 million.

It's crucial to highlight a rather concerning point. The three ongoing schemes were approved in 2017, 2018, and 2021 and remain incomplete. Particularly troubling are the cases of:

- Strengthening of Monitoring and Surveillance of Health System Government of Sindh (USAID): Approved on 30-11-2017 and still not completed and currently withheld.
- Establishment of Sindh Safe Blood Transfusion Services Project (Phase-II) (Government of Germany): Approved on 5-2-2018 and currently withheld.

Furthermore, another scheme with a foreign component, *Establishment of Child Health Care Institute Sukkur (Korean soft loan)*, approved in 2021 appears unlikely to meet its projected completion date of 30-6-2023.

Here's a deeper dive into these projects:

ESTABLISHMENT OF CHILD HEALTH CARE INSTITUTE SUKKUR (REVISED):

Despite having a significant chunk of foreign assistance, the expenditure till now is quite low. This could be because the project only started in 2021. It's vital to ramp up the pace to ensure the timely completion and utilization of foreign assistance.

STRENGTHENING OF MONITORING AND SURVEILLANCE OF THE HEALTH SYSTEM GOVERNMENT OF SINDH:

This ongoing scheme from 2017 is lagging in expenditure. Given its focus on monitoring and surveillance of the health system, it's imperative to accelerate the project, especially in the wake of global health challenges.

ESTABLISHMENT OF SINDH SAFE BLOOD TRANSFUSION SERVICES PROJECT (PHASE-II):

The entire budget throw-forward shows that no expenditure has been made on this project since its inception in 2018. This is concerning, especially for a project focused on blood transfusion services. Immediate intervention and review are needed to get this project on track.

ESTABLISHMENT OF MATERNAL & CHILD HEALTH CARE CENTRE AT LIAQUAT UNIVERSITY HOSPITAL JAMSHORO:

For a new scheme, the expenditure is on track. Given the focus on maternal and child health care, it's crucial to ensure that this project gets the needed attention and funds to cater to the health needs of the targeted population.

SINDH HUMAN CAPITAL PROJECT - SINDH 1000 DAYS' PLUS PROGRAM:

This new scheme has a vast budget but has not seen any expenditure. Given its ambitious title and apparent focus on the crucial first 1000 days of a child's life, initiating this project promptly to achieve its objectives is essential.

CLOSING THOUGHTS:

The delay in completing the health schemes, especially those financed through foreign aid, raises significant concerns. These unfinished projects indicate potential inefficiencies or challenges in the province's health department. An in-depth investigation is necessary to discern the underlying reasons for these delays and to develop strategies to ensure the timely completion of health projects. The health of the province's citizens is paramount, and efficient utilization of foreign aid and budgetary allocations is pivotal in achieving robust healthcare outcomes.

SUBSECTOR 2: ANALYSIS OF DEVELOPMENT SCHEMES UNDER "MEDICAL EDUCATION

The importance of robust and well-rounded medical education cannot be overstated in healthcare. SUBSECTOR 2: ANALYSIS OF DEVELOPMENT SCHEMES UNDER "MEDICAL EDUCATION" delves into the intricacies of funding, execution, and outcomes of development projects aimed at enriching the quality of medical education in Sindh. This section offers a view of how budget allocations, releases, and expenditures are being managed to elevate educational standards, thereby shaping the future of healthcare in the region. Given the pivotal role that medical education plays in ensuring a competent and ethical healthcare workforce, this analysis seeks to assess the efficacy of ongoing and proposed schemes and identify improvement areas.

1. ESTABLISHMENT OF MEDICAL COLLEGE IN KARACHI

This project, initiated in 2012, has been ongoing for over a decade. Although a significant portion of the funds (around 62%) has been spent, the project still has a substantial throwforward amount. Notably, there was no fund release or expenditure for 2021-22, indicating a potential stall or delay in the project.

2. ESTABLISHMENT OF SHAHEED BENAZIR BHUTTO MEDICAL COLLEGE LYARI, KARACHI:

This project is near completion with over 99% of the estimated cost already spent. However, there is a significant difference between the final budget and the total expenditure for 2021-22, indicating that not all allocated funds were utilized.

ESTABLISHMENT OF GHULAM MUHAMMAD MAHAR MEDICAL COLLEGE, SUKKUR:

This scheme, initiated in 2018, has spent around 43% of its total estimated cost. While funds for 2021-22 were fully released, there's a slight gap between the released amount and the total expenditure, indicating some funds were left unutilized.

4. KHAIRPUR MEDICAL COLLEGE AT KHAIRPUR (REVISED):

Initiated in 2015, roughly 37% of the funds have been utilized. The release for 2021-22 was slightly below the final budget. There's a difference between the released funds and the total expenditure, indicating that some allocated amounts were not utilized fully.

5. ESTABLISHMENT OF MEDICAL COLLEGE AT MIRPURKHAS:

This project shows good fiscal discipline for 2021-22, with full utilization of allocated funds. However, considering the throw forward, a substantial amount is still needed to complete the project.

6. RENOVATION & REHABILITATION OF CHANDKA MEDICAL COLLEGE AND CONSTRUCTION OF NEW NOORI GIRLS HOSTEL OF SHAHEED MOHTARMA BENAZIR BHUTTO MEDICAL UNIVERSITY, LARKANO

The project is nearing its completion with over 83% of the funds already utilized. However, the expenditure for 2021-22 is noticeably below the allocation, which may lead to further delays in finalizing the project.

7. CONSTRUCTION OF MAKHDOOM MUHAMMAD ZAMAN TALIB-UL-MOULA MEDICAL COLLEGE AND TEACHING HOSPITAL AT HALA:

As a new project, it's alarming to see that no funds were released or utilized for 2021-22, suggesting administrative or funding hurdles at the onset of the project.

8. ESTABLISHMENT OF PARAMEDICAL AND NURSING SCHOOL AT SYED ABDULLAH SHAH INSTITUTE OF MEDICAL SCIENCES, SEHWAN:

For a new scheme, it shows commendable progress, with the full allocated budget being released and utilized.

9. REHABILITATION AND EXPANSION OF PUBLIC HEALTH SCHOOL LARKANO:

Another new project where no funds were released or utilized for 2021-22. This indicates potential delays or challenges even before the project fully takes off.

GENERAL OBSERVATIONS:

- The majority of the projects are ongoing, with only a few new schemes introduced.
- Projects like the "Establishment of Medical College at Karachi" and "Construction of Makhdoom Muhammad Zaman Talib-ul-Moula Medical College and Teaching Hospital at Hala" show no expenditure for 2021-22. This indicates potential challenges in implementation or funding delays.
- There's a consistent pattern of funds being allocated but not being fully utilized across multiple projects, suggesting administrative or operational challenges.
- Projects like the "Establishment of Paramedical and Nursing School at Syed Abdullah Shah Institute of Medical Sciences, Sehwan" show a 100% match between allocation, release, and expenditure for 2021-22, which is a positive sign.

Overall, while progress is evident across multiple schemes under the "Medical Education" sub-sector, there are also clear signs of delays and potential inefficiencies in fund utilization. Proper monitoring, timely fund releases, and administrative streamlining can help ensure smoother progress for these critical projects.

SUBSECTOR 3: OTHER HOSPITALS

This subsection offers an analysis of the development schemes geared towards improving and expanding these essential facilities in Sindh. As the often-overlooked pillars of the healthcare system, these hospitals play a vital role in ensuring equitable access to quality medical care. Our analysis aims to shed light on how budgeting, project status, and other financial aspects influence these hospitals' capacity and performance. The data gives a comprehensive overview of the "Other Hospital" sub-sector. Based on the data, here's a summarized analysis:

OVERALL STATUS:

• Total Schemes: 128

• Total Estimated Cost: PKR 51,818 million

• Total allocation for 2021-22: PKR 11,089 million

• Revised Development Budget: PKR 8,086 million

• Total Release: PKR 4,434 million

• Total Expenditure: PKR 2,629 million

BUDGET RELEASE & EXPENDITURE:

- Only 54.69% (70 of 128) of the projects were allocated a budget this year.
- Out of the 70 projects that received a budget, 64.29% (45 of 70) reported an expenditure.
- The expenditure-to-release ratio was 100% in only 9 projects, indicating that only these projects utilized the entire released budget.
- The release-to-budget ratio was 100% in 21 projects, meaning only these projects received the full budget they were allocated.

PROJECTS WITH NO BUDGET OR EXPENDITURE:

- 45.31% (58 of 128) of projects received no budget.
- Even among projects that did receive a budget, 35.71% (25 of 70) reported no expenditure.

Possible Points for Deep Dive Analysis:

- **Project Status**: Understanding why projects were withheld and some are delayed is critical. Identifying common reasons could help streamline processes and anticipate future delays.
- Budget Efficiency: A significant discrepancy exists between allocated budgets, released funds, and actual
 expenditures. It's essential to investigate the reasons behind this to ensure efficient use of funds in the
 future.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- BUDGETING & ALLOCATION: The disparity between the allocation, release, and expenditure calls for a review of budgeting processes. Are funds being allocated based on priority, feasibility, or other criteria?
- PROJECT EXECUTION: A deeper investigation is required for projects that received funds but reported no expenditure. Are there administrative bottlenecks, lack of resources, or other hindrances?
- PERFORMANCE REVIEW: For projects where released funds equal expenditure, understanding what led to this efficiency could provide insights to improve other projects.
- MONITORING & EVALUATION: Introduce or strengthen M&E frameworks to regularly assess project progress and ensure accountability.

- 2. **Improve MEC Status**: There's a need for rigorous monitoring and evaluation to move the projects from "Unsatisfactory" to a better status.
- 3. **Budget Utilization**: An immediate review should be conducted to understand the bottlenecks for projects where budgets have been allocated but not used.
- 4. **New Schemes**: Since new schemes have zero expenditure, it may be worth assessing the feasibility and readiness of these projects before further allocations are made.
- 5. **Review Allocation Strategy**: Given that most schemes have zero expenditure against allocations, a review of the budget allocation strategy might be required.

SUBSECTOR 5: PREVENTIVE PROGRAMS

The "Preventive Programs" sub-sector is relatively small, with only 2 projects. Here is a quick summary based on the provided data:

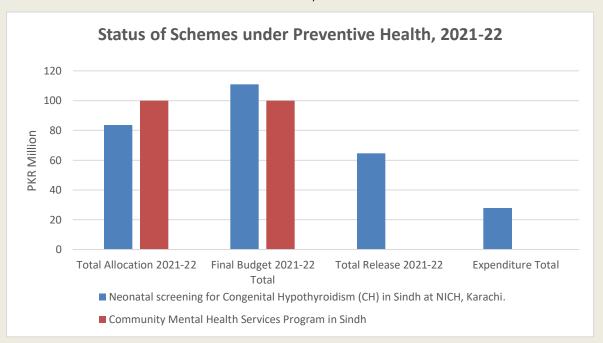

- 3. **Budget Re-Appropriation**: The first project had funds canceled and then adopted through re-appropriation, suggesting that the project might be undergoing changes or experiencing issues that need to be addressed.
- 4. **Monitoring and Surveillance**: Given that both projects are Ongoing and one has been subject to reappropriation and withdrawal of funds, a more robust monitoring mechanism is needed.
- 5. **Project Timelines**: One project is nearing its completion date (June 2022), and its current status suggests that it may not be completed on time. Immediate action might be needed to get it back on track.

- 3. **Utilization**: Overall utilization of funds varies widely across projects, from near 0% to over 100%. This could indicate a lack of consistency in project planning and execution.
- 4. **Allocation and Expenditure**: There is a significant variance in allocated versus spent funds for some projects. For instance, some have nearly 100% utilization of allocated funds, while others have zero, which might warrant further investigation.
- 5. **MEC and DRO**: Multiple schemes are withheld. This could imply bureaucratic delays that might be affecting project progress.

EXTRAORDINARY FIGURES

- **Provision of Linear Accelerator at DUHS Karachi**: This project shows an exceptionally high expenditure relative to its total allocation for 2021-22, registering a utilization of around 743%. This is far beyond the allocated budget and could be indicative of unplanned or emergency expenditures.
- Establishment of Bio Safety Lab at Sindh Infectious Diseases Control Hospital, Karachi: This project also exhibits over 100% utilization, which might indicate either underestimation of costs or expedited work that required more immediate funding.

OVERALL OBSERVATIONS

- 1. **Inconsistency in Fund Utilization**: There is a clear need to align fund allocations more closely with actual expenditures. Wide variances suggest planning gaps.
- 2. **Time Management**: The completion dates clustered in 2022 suggest either an optimistic outlook or a rush to complete projects, which could impact quality.
- 3. **Regulatory Delays**: The schemes withheld could face administrative or approval bottlenecks that may delay completion.
- 4. **Budgetary Concerns**: Extraordinary figures in some projects could indicate budgetary misestimations and may necessitate reallocations or audits.

OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To advocate for increased budget allocation in the health sector for the fiscal year 2022-23 in Sindh.
- 2. To push for timely release of allocated funds for ongoing and new healthcare projects.
- 3. To encourage transparency and accountability in the utilization of released funds.
- 4. To promote community involvement in health budgeting decisions.

METHODOLOGY:

The campaign will comprise a desk analysis of development budget-related data for the year 2021-22 from the budget books of Sindh. This will be combined with field research, interviews, and consultations with stakeholders, including healthcare providers, community leaders, and policymakers.
